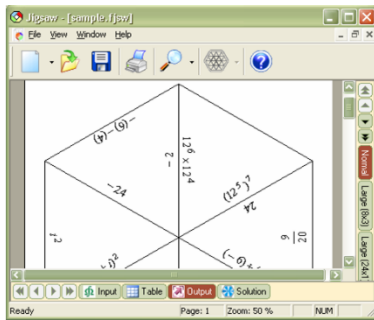
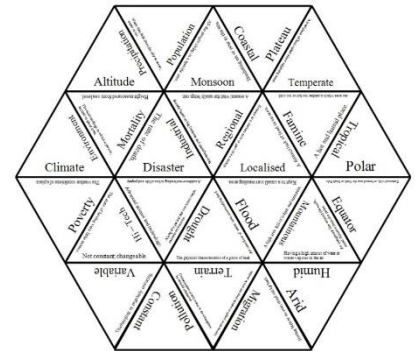

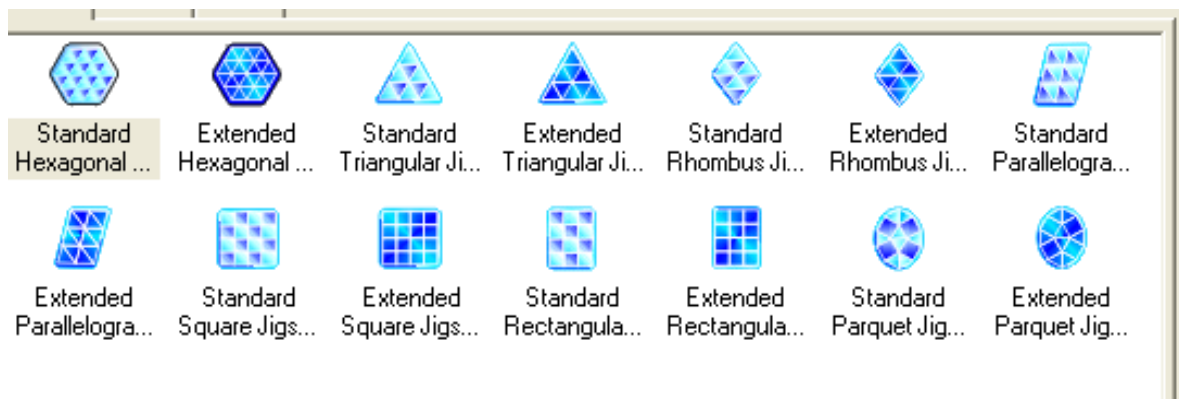


Introduction
